

A Message from the Manse

Dear friends,

As we approach the Advent season, I wonder what emotions and expectations you carry within you? Are you looking forward to a return of some "normality"? We'll likely have our Christmas services – which we so missed last year – with a Nativity Service led by the children and young people, as well as our Christingle Service, Watchnight Services (early and late) and our Christmas Day service. Will we see you along? Strangely, these will be my first Christmas services in person, what with being ill the first year and then the pandemic in the second! I do hope to see you over the Advent season.

I think we must admit, we are very much creatures of habit – we like life to go the old familiar ways; we want normal; we prefer the rhythms of life we have become so accustomed to. Humanity has changed very little in this regard over the generations, so I suspect that the various characters of the Christmas story were just going about their regular lives, probably appreciating their own normal too.

But then comes Christmas – and everything is turned on its head for these individuals! A virgin is pregnant, shepherds are startled by angels; a king is threatened by reports of a possible coup – wow!

Yet, in the midst of normality being disrupted, God was doing something, God was at work, God was telling people not to be afraid, that there was good news which would bring joy, and there would even be the hope of peace (Luke 2: 10, 14). Maybe when some people heard this, they appreciated their normal being disrupted – maybe they couldn't wait?! Maybe this news gave them life, maybe they had got too comfortable and this is exactly what they needed from God.

However, maybe you're approaching this Advent differently, maybe you've experienced a lot of disruption or heartache this past year. Maybe your normal Christmas is never likely to return. Nevertheless, might the same words be for you too – not to dampen the difficulty, or minimise the hurt, but to give a measure of strength, hope and comfort as you journey through this season.

However, as we are approaching Advent, I pray that you and your families will know the truth and power of the Advent message: may it disrupt us where that is needed and comfort us where we feel broken, and through it all may you know that God came near through Jesus – and He still is, even today.

"It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas" as the song goes and it is only November as I write this article. But is it beginning to look a lot like the Christmas we knew in the past but with the continuing presence of Covid-19 things are still going to be somewhat different again this year. I guess we will still be singing "Silent Night" and "Hark the Herald" from behind a mask as we gather in Church for Nativity and Watchnight Services and as we share Communion together, it will still be a neatly conveniently packaged container of bread and wine.

This Christmas looks like it's possibly going to be a bit better than last year with less internet shopping required and perhaps a trip or two to Glasgow or Edinburgh to do the Christmas gift shop or maybe you'r going to pass on your list and let family or friends shop for you as they had to do last Christmas.

Giving, not just for Christmas but also birthdays and other special occasions has been somewhat different of late and the choice may be a bit more limited than in the past but still we want to give because of the joy we see as our loved ones open their gifts on Christmas Day.

What can take the joy out of giving are the obligatory gifts. Despite working from home there may still be the "secret Santa". There's the box of sweets you keep by the door to hand the Smiths when they come to call as you know they will, once a year. And don't forget the gift for Great Aunt Jeannie whom you haven't liked since she pinched your cheeks when you were little. Really difficult are the gifts that come with long invisible strings dangling from them, gifts so very expensive that you could never afford to reciprocate.

I wonder how Mary and Joseph felt as they watched richly robed wise men kneel before their child offering alabaster jars of precious myrrh, inlaid boxes heavy with the scent of frankincense, and iron-bound chests laden with gold - gifts fit for a king. How could they possibly repay?

I guess the most troublesome gift at Christmas is the Child Himself. What do we say? We smile nicely and pat the humbly- wrapped present. "How nice of you, God, to have been so thoughtful," we mumble politely. But the Gift lies in the cupboard unopened year after year. Perhaps because we don't expect to find much inside except a useless religious trinket. Perhaps because we don't feel any need for God just now. Perhaps because we know that if we unwrap the Gift we'll be obligated to the Giver beyond what we can ever repay. And so it sits ... and so it sits until in loneliness, in pain, in utter desperation we tug at the ribbons and tear off the wrappings, hoping against hope we'll find inside what we've longed for.

Unconditional Love!

Christmas may not be "like the good old days" but the gift given by God never changes. It has been given with love and comes without any conditions but, unlike the socks, hankies or other unwanted gifts, let's not pack the Christchild away with the tree. We need Him in our lives even more as we head into 2022. We may not always be able to share with God's people in the sanctuary week after week but we can keep Him in our hearts 365 days of every year.

Having God's Word in your own language.

Based on article in Words For Life (Wycliffe Bible Translators) Autumn 2021

Rev Enoch Wandera grew up in a Christian family in Uganda, but as he admits, 'I lived a very bad life before I became a Christian.' After he started work in the Ugandan prison service, he got 'swept up into the world – the world of drinking, the world of partying, the world of immorality. I drank myself out of a job.' One day, a friend persuaded him to go back to church, and God revealed himself to Enoch in a sort of vision.

Enoch went on to become a pastor, looking after eight churches. One day, an assistant preached while Enoch was away visiting another church. He spoke on 1 John 5:12:

'Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the

Son of God does not have life.'

'Because my assistant wasn't able to read it in his own language, he misunderstood the verse. He preached that if you don't have children then you don't have a place in the kingdom of God!' When an older man spoke to Enoch about the upset this had caused him, his eyes were opened 'to the great need for people to have the word of God in their own language,'

'From that point on' Enoch says, 'I have had a passion for Bible translation.' His dream has come true with the recent publication of the Lunyole New Testament, and he says that seeing people reading it in church each week is giving him the motivation to finish the Old Testament. 'I want to express my gratitude and thanks to all those people and churches in the UK and Ireland who have helped us.'

<u>Juniors</u>


It was great to be back in the Church Halls in September, meeting with the girls face to face after meeting on Zoom for so long.

A Letter from the Duncan's in South Africa

October 2021

Dear Friends,

This letter is long overdue but it is not because we have been laid low with COVID-19. It just seems that we get busier and busier and this keeps us occupied. Life has certainly changed but we have adjusted well as we were already used to working from home. We have taken all the necessary precautions, and follow the protocols carefully. We have had our two vaccinations with almost no side effects! We are fortunate that in South Africa our government's policies have meant that we have fewer than 500 new infections per day and fewer than 60 deaths per day. This is excellent progress as the roll out of vaccinations progresses well. We are now down to Level 2 of the lockdown which is part of the government's measured response to the pandemic. Our current recovery rate is 96.3%.

Sandra has been incredibly busy with proof-reading. This is possibly because with lockdown and people working from home, students have more time to devote to their research. It is a never-ending stream. In addition, she keeps the students sane when they are under pressure from their supervisors.

She has also been busy with our elder, Violet Mashao at Mamelodi. As we have written before:

Thankfully, due to ongoing support from Scottish partners, particularly Cumbernauld Old and Brightons, we have been able to increase our involvement with the orphans' project at Mamelodi East congregation. These kids are a special risk at this time. The support given helps them understand that when all else around them is collapsing, the church is still there helping in times of great need, and that church means far more than the local congregation which nourishes them.

Just before Easter, Graham was invited by the minister, Rev Dr Fundiswa Kobo, to lead a seminar on the role of the eldership. This was a good opportunity to catch up with elders he had not seen for some time.

We have had spells at church where we went totally on to Zoom services but with the change in lockdown regulations we are back to 'normal' worship with Zoom for the elderly. On Good Friday we had an offering of Dan Forrest's Requiem for the Living by Unison voices, one of Pretoria's superb choirs. This was a performance of hope for Easter and during the continuing pandemic.

Graham has been involved in an increasing number of Zoom sessions. He taught our Post Academic Training (PAT) students contemporary spirituality,

preaching and church law. Then he was one of the respondents to the memorial lecture given in honour of our recently deceased colleague, Rev Prof Vuyani Vellem.

After a spell of online teaching at the Baptist College, we returned to contact teaching in July. The semester has now ended and students are about to write their final end of year exams. This year Graham was asked to prepare a new module for our Higher Certificate in Biblical Studies on South African History of Christianity. The college has been taking the teaching the History of Christianity more seriously since Graham joined the staff; which is gratifying.

St Augustine's College has been teaching online since the first lockdown, so that was another online teaching experience: a week-long honours module in Historical Theology. Students all passed!

The major change we have had to face is the lack of family and friends visiting us from the UK; hopefully, that will be resolved next year? We are fortunate in having local friends who keep us in good company in the meantime.

As we write this, we are preparing for a brief visit to the UK during November to see our family. For the most part we will be self-isolating in Brighton with our sons and then with our grand-daughter and her partner in Longcroft. We will not be 'doing the rounds' as we normally do. It is just that we need to see our family. Please excuse us if this appears to be selfish but we are at a great distance and it is almost two years since we saw them. We have struggled so hard in South Africa to overcome the pandemic, which is not our opinion of the situation in the UK, especially England. We acknowledge that this is not the case in Scotland as we see from international news broadcasts and reports. However, at our age and both having diabetes, we have decided to take a 'conservative' approach to our visit.

We are grateful for the ongoing contact. This has been a particular blessing during the past two years. We hope all is well with you and your congregations. If all goes well, we hope to make a visit to the UK during June/July next year.

We are looking forward to meeting back in person in Redding Church Hall on Thursday 18th November at 6.45pm.


Please remember our Friends in your prayers as we meet together in person and that we will all be kept safe and that they will enjoy learning about our special friend and Saviour -Jesus.

News from our Sunday Schools

It has been absolutely wonderful to have all of our groups meeting back in person since August. I have had lots of the congregation commenting to me how wonderful it is to meet once again as a whole church family. I certainly enjoy the children's talks and all that childlike wonder they involve - especially when they get to join in!

Crèche has been running although we are not currently running a rota as parents are tending to stay with their children at present. As this changes over time, we will adapt to the needs of the users. It's just fantastic to have the wee ones with us in the sanctuary while the parents are able to relax and watch the service on the big screen while the wee ones play.

Company Section

After a gap of over 18 months, we finally managed to start back properly with face to face meetings in the church halls on Friday 22nd October. We weren't sure how many boys we'd have along since the numbers had been reduced during the period when we could only meet online so we were very pleased to welcome 23 boys on our first night back. We are still not quite able to offer the full range of BB activities and, we were disappointed to note that the Battalion events have been postponed for this session although we hope this may be reviewed with a more positive outcome during January.

The Company Section programme this year is in the capable hands of Colin and Josh Heggie with the support of the rest of the staff. We have been able to do some squad drill and games as well as some classes where we used materials prepared by the staff at BB headquarters. We discussed whether it was ever ok to steal and this threw up some interesting thoughts. Colin used a big ball of string which we all held and demonstrated how a single action by one person could have a ripple effect on a lot of people. Finance Update

The year continues to be a very extraordinary time for us all and it is most heartening to see your continuing financial support.

The following summary reflects the position at the end of September as presented to the Deacons' Court on 9th November.

Our overall expenditure to date is £18,456 less than the budget. The major factor in this underspend is £12,435 within the property repairs and maintenance budget. Only works to ensure the integrity or health and safety of the building are to be undertaken. This outstanding work will be included in the 2022 budget, when perhaps this restriction will be removed. The heat and light costs saving to date despite the increase use of the halls is £2,050. The Church has a fixed price contract that expires in May 2023. The Job Retention Scheme ended on 30th September and this saving on wages costs amounted to around £1800.

National Giving Day - All Church of Scotland congregations were encouraged by this year's General Assembly to take part in a Church-wide National Giving Day over the season of Harvest between 5th September and 31st October. The sum raised during this period amounted to £4,475.52. There was £2,950 gift aided which will realise a further £737.50.

This money raised **will not** be assessable for Ministries and Mission purposes. All monies raised will stay with the local church and none of it will be passed to '121'.

In the meantime, stay safe and in good health and thank you for your continued generosity to the Lord's work in this your church.

Lynn Cameron from Tilly Baptist Church doesn't have time to be a befriender currently, so she decided, for the second year running, to open her garden to the public to raise funds for CAP.

A whopping £620 was raised and 60% of that has been donated to our Debt Centre.

What makes a good befriender?

A good befriender is someone who is friendly and non-judgemental. They are patient, understand the concept of keeping good boundaries and are trustworthy in maintaining confidentiality.

What do befrienders do?

Befrienders can go on visits with Debt Coaches and listen out for practical needs and ways in which we might connect clients to community. They may pray for the person.

Some befrienders
encourage people by calling
or messaging them. Others
are happy to maintain
contact with people,
meeting up with them and
inviting them to things. One
of our befrienders took
someone a few household
essentials until she had
received her budget and
debt advice. They later did
the CAP Money Course
together and now meet for
coffee and a chat.

What difference do befrienders make?

Someone with a befriender is more likely to complete the journey out of debt and to feel able to accept invitations to things. It can be life transforming!
